## Online Database Resources

Author's name. (if given--last name first) "Title of the article."(in quotation marks) Name of Publication. (underlined or *italics*) Publication date. Online Service. (underlined) Web Address (place in < >) (Date of visit).

### **If the name of the author is given:**

Stein, Lisa. "No Bones About It." U.S. News and World Report. 4 April 2003. Student Resource Center. <galenet.galegroup.com> (14 January 2004).

### **If the name of the author is NOT given:**

"Outer Limits." Scholastic News. 2 October 2006. Student Research Center. <galenet.galegroup.com.com> (6 December 2006).

## Encyclopedias:

### **If the name of the author is given:**

Shellenberger, J.A. "Rice." Grolier Multimedia Encyclopedia. 2000. Grolier Online. <go.grolier.com> (22 September 2000).

### **If the name of the author is NOT given:**

"Paris." Encyclopedia Americana. 2000. Grolier Online. <go.grolier.com> (26 October 2000).

## Internet Citations

Internet citations are not very consistent. Basically, you need the **title of your article**, the **website**, the **URL** (which is the web address: www....) and the **date you went online**. Sometimes the website name is also part of the URL, i.e. abcnews.com is the **website** name; www.abcnews.go.com is the **URL** or web address. If there is an author's name given, include it (last name first); if a date for the actual article is given, include that as well. For the URL, you only type up to the first slash (/) in between these symbols < >. <www.hsa.brown.edu>

Author's name. (if given--last name first) "Title."(in quotation marks) Name of the website. (underlined or *italics*) Original publication date (if given). <www....>(Date you accessed the website).

### **If the name of the author is given:**

Hickey, Jim. "Choice Cuts." abcnews.com. <www.abcnews.go.com> (2 October 2000).

### **If the name of the author is NOT given:**

"Gore to Focus on Targeted Tax Cuts." Campaign 2000. 21 August 2000. <www.usatoday.com> (2 October 2000).
