Role of the School Psychologist in Darien

Role of the Elementary School Psychologist

School psychologists create a supporting learning and social environment for all students.

- Providing support and consultation to classroom teachers
- Addressing immediate needs (e.g., students in crisis)
- Designing IEP goals/objectives, clinical intervention, behavior intervention plans (BIPs)
- Pre-referral intervention (SRBI)
- IEP- and 504-mandated counseling (individual and group)
- Parent training
- Meeting attendance: PPT, 504, team, and parent meetings
- Collecting data and designing data collection systems to support classroom teachers
- Conducting evaluations
 - Psychoeducational: cognitive, social, emotional, executive functioning
 - Classroom observations: qualitative, time-on-task, environmental modifications
 - Functional behavior assessments (FBAs)
 - Risk assessments for students in crisis (e.g., self-injurious behaviors)



Supporting the Transition to Darien High School

Developmental Guidance - delivered through <u>**Guidance Seminar**</u> program. Each student is scheduled into a Seminar for one quarter (approximately 5 lessons).

Advisory - Each student is a part of an Advisory group which remains the same throughout high school. Each counselor is an Advisor.

Transition Planning - The DHS counselors are involved in the transition planning of all 8th to 9th grade students through a variety of programs/events.
